- Credential, train and prepare these volunteers in advance of a public health event






MRC Status

MRC Volunteers

- Local decision (based on needs)
- May include those in training, in active practice, or retired
- Medical and public health professionals
- Persons with no health experience, but who help support health activities through their expertise in communications, administration, logistics, and other essential functions



Benefits

- Provides supplemental personnel to support existing public health and emergency response systems
- Provides mechanisms for information sharing and coordination among the many community partners
- Enhances community preparedness through citizen involvement
- Enables communities to meet specific health needs
- Allows communities more autonomy in responding to emergencies, with less reliance on state or national resources
- Bolsters public health and emergency response infrastructures by providing supplemental personnel
- Enables communities to meet specific health needs
- Allows the local community more autonomy not as reliant on state and national resources
- Gives community members the opportunity to participate in developing strategies to make their communities healthier and safer
- Provides mechanisms for information sharing and coordination between all partner organizations
- Provides a dialogue between emergency management and public health agencies
- Allows for national recognition of local public health and emergency response efforts

2005 Hurricane Response and Recovery Efforts

- Establishing medical needs shelters
- Providing medical support in evacuee shelters and clinics
- Filling in locally for others who were deployed to the disaster-affected regions
- Immunizing responders prior to their deployment to the disaster affected regions
- Staffing response hotlines
- Teaching emergency preparedness to community members

An Evolution of the MRC Concept

- Identifying mechanisms to allow involvement outside of local jurisdictions
- Various mechanisms
 - state-to-state mutual aid agreements and the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC)
 - American Red Cross
 - HHS "Federalization" process



National Efforts

MRC Support for American Red Cross Disaster Operations

Health services, mental health and shelter operations roles

> 700 applications received

> 400 MRC members received assignments or are approved for travel

MRC Support for HHS Recovery Efforts

Provide supplemental staffing for special needs shelters, clinics, strike teams and other assignments

- > 800 MRC members volunteered to support this mission
- ~ 200 MRC members activated



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
