RE: FY 2020 Budget Summary

Dear Councillors:

I would like to thank the City Auditor, Assistant City Auditor and Business Manager for their hard work in assembling the Departmental requests which totaled \$284,932,719 and for formulating the Mayor's Recommendations in the total amount of \$278,112,317 for programs and services contained within the 29 program budgets.

This year the budget is available on a flash drive and uses less paper as it is two-sided. Once provided to the City Council, the budget will be added to the Auditor's webpage on the City's website for public access. The FY2020 Department budgets continue to highlight requested changes and provide explanations for the same within each program budget.

The FY2020 budget has a <u>net</u> increase of \$9,287,255, which is a net 3.5% increase over last year's budget according to the attached budget-to-budget comparison and revenue/expenditure pie charts.

Some of the major increases are as follows:

The local aid figures are based upon the House Budget which could change with the adoption of the state budget.

CPW and Engineering

Last year's budget requested the reorganization of the CPW and Engineering public works functions to benefit the public and the consumers who actually

interact with both departments; best practices such as the 311 system, which one department operates and the other did not; and the elimination of two dominions with public works and water and sewer functions for the benefit of the organizations themselves, the taxpayers and the public.

With the City Council passage of an ordinance amendment on April 4, 2019 (Council Order #34290), this reorganization can now take effect on July 1, 2019.

Public Safety

Police/Fire/Dispatch

The complement for firefighters is 169, which reflects one additional firefighter. A stipend for one incumbent firefighter (with qualifications) to serve as a radio liaison to oversee the radio infrastructure citywide for both police and fire is also included. The complement for police officers is 154, which reflects the 7 new full-time School Resource Officers (SROs) for our elementary schools budgeted last year. The SROs have now been hired and will be working in the schools in late August 2019. The E911 Dispatch Center has a full complement with the addition of 1 Emergency Telecommunications Dispatcher last year.

Building/Wires/Health

A part-time Code Enforcement Officer (for the Nuisance Ordinance and other compliance issues) granted last year, is requested for full-time this year to fulfill the community needs. The new electrician granted last year was hired to assist in converting the current streetlights to energy efficient LED lights and other assigned duties.

The Health Department has additional money to address rodent education and rodent issues citywide.

Schools

Education continues to be a priority as evidenced by my budget recommendation. However, to be fiscally cognizant, I have made cuts to the School Committee's request in the total amount of \$751,989 (use of special education circuit breaker reserve-\$200,000; additional resignations/retirements-\$200,000; technology items that can be funded from FY2019 funds-\$331,989; and additional grant funds-\$20,000).

The Schools continue to be faced with federal and state unfunded mandates and multiple coordinated reviews.

Planning

The City Council did not address my request in the last budget for the City's Planning Director's duties to be modified to include true planning duties, such as coordination of all City Council Special Permits and as-of-right development

projects to protect the City's neighborhoods and provide clarity to citizens, investors and City Departments. Therefore, the principal planner position designed to assist with those development and permitting coordination functions has not been requested in the FY2020 budget. Those functions remain with the City Council and its City Clerk's Office and not the Planning Department.

However, included in the FY 2020 budget is a second Assistant Director of Planning position pursuant to the City Council's Compensation Ordinance change passed on February 26, 2019 (Council Order #34363) for an "Assistant Planning Director/Sustainability".

Council on Aging

Last year's funding for an additional van driver to transport senior citizens has been implemented. Additional money for meals has been added due to increased participation and outreach by the COA to all seniors in the community.

Library

The FY2020 Library budget will not require a state waiver. A Grade 13 full-time Library Department Head has been added for the Teen Room (two part-time positions not requested). This position, as well as the positions added over the last two budgets, are to address the additional programs that the Library is now providing to citizens of all ages. A grade increase has also been recommended for the Library Director.

Human Resources Department

With the creation of this Department by City Council ordinance (Council Order #33558, dated 10/24/2016), one Assistant Human Resources Director position is requested with the hope that the City Council will eventually transfer "employee benefits" functions citywide to the Human Services Department, while keeping the "treasury payroll" financial functions with the Treasury Department. This would consolidate employee benefits (currently handled by multiple departments) into HR.

Law

A staff attorney has been recommended to address the numerous opinion requests from the City Council and to assist the Treasury Department with tax collections and other functions as assigned.

Recreation

With the passage of the Compensation Ordinance by City Council (Council Order #33436, dated April 24, 2019), creating the position, a Park Ranger position has been requested to help manage the hundreds of acres of parks and open space.

I have also made reductions and where necessary reallocations to Departments' existing line items based upon historical expenditure trends.

I am available to provide more detail with regard to the full budget at my hearing.

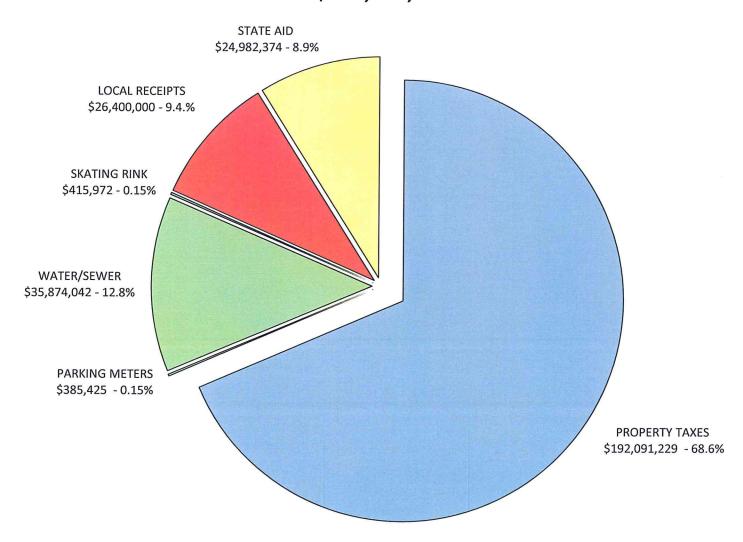

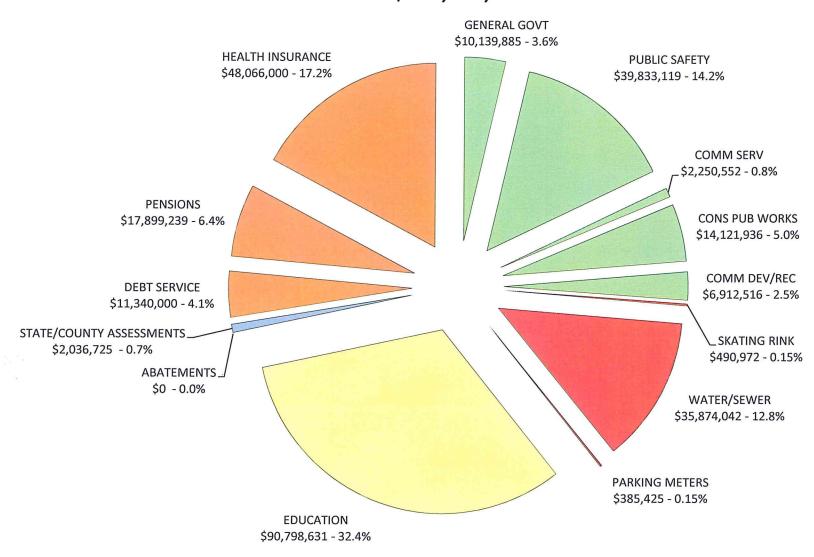

Part I ADMINISTRATION OF THE GOVERNMENT

Title VII CITIES, TOWNS AND DISTRICTS

Chapter 44 MUNICIPAL FINANCE

Section TRANSFER OF APPROPRIATIONS; RESTRICTIONS 33B

[Subsection (a) effective until November 7, 2016. For text effective November 7, 2016, see below.]

Section 33B. (a) On recommendation of the mayor, the city council may, by majority vote, transfer any amount appropriated for the use of any department to another appropriation for the same department. In addition, the city council may, by majority vote, on recommendation of the mayor, transfer within the last 2 months of any fiscal year, or during the first 15 days of the new fiscal year to apply to the previous fiscal year, an amount appropriated for the use of any department other than a municipal light department or a school department to the appropriation for any other department, but the amount transferred from 1 department to another may not exceed, in the aggregate, 3 per cent of the annual budget of the department from which the transfer is made. Except as provided in the preceding sentence, no transfer shall be made of any amount appropriated for the use of any city department to the appropriation for any other department except by a 2/3 vote of the city

of the amount of the transfer by the department having control of the appropriation from which the transfer is proposed to be made. No transfer involving a municipal light department or a school department shall be made under the previous sentence without the approval of the amount of the transfer by a vote of the municipal light department board or by a vote of the school committee, respectively.

(a) On recommendation of the mayor, the city council may, by majority vote, transfer any amount appropriated for the use of any department to another appropriation for the same department. In addition, the city council may, by majority vote, on recommendation of the mayor, transfer within the last 2 months of any fiscal year, or during the first 15 days of the new fiscal year, to apply to the previous fiscal year, any amount appropriated, other than for the use of a municipal light department or a school department, to any other appropriation. Except as provided in the preceding sentence, no transfer shall be made of any amount appropriated for the use of any city department to the appropriation for any other department except by a 2/3 vote of the city council on recommendation of the mayor and with the written approval of the amount of the transfer by the department having control of the appropriation from which the transfer is proposed to be made. No transfer involving a municipal light department or a school department shall be made under the previous sentence without the approval of the amount of the transfer by a vote of the municipal light department board or by a vote of the school committee, respectively.

- (b) A town may, by majority vote at any meeting duly held, transfer any amount previously appropriated to any other use authorized by law. Alternatively, the selectmen, with the concurrence of the finance committee or other entity establish under section 16 of chapter 39, may transfer within the last 2 months of any fiscal year, or during the first 15 days of the new fiscal year to apply to the previous fiscal year, any amount appropriated for the use of any department other than a municipal light department or a school department to the appropriation for any other department or within a department, but the amount transferred from 1 department to another or within a department may not exceed, in the aggregate, 3 per cent of the annual budget of the department from or within which the transfer is made or \$5,000, whichever is greater.
