









Google Street View

Timeline

- January. Deed, Jacob Farwell to Lewis Bemis [MLR 389/317] tract of land bounded on south by the "contemplated street (called Middle Street)". No mention of buildings.
- 1840 March. Deed, Nathaniel Maynard, Esq. & John Abbott, machinist to Lewis Bemis [MLR 391/159] tract of land bounded on east by Common St., and on south by Middle St. No mention of buildings.
- 1840 March. Deed, Lewis Bemis to Daniel J. Sawyer [MLR 391/160] bounded on east by Common St. and on south by Middle St.
- Oct. Agreement, between Daniel J. Sawyer, carpenter, and Lewis Bemis [MLR 396/394]. To build a house with two tenements, 36 ft. long by 17 wide with a shed on each 10 ft. long by 14 ft. wide. Stairs to be built straight, run moldings around all the doors and windows, with a division between the tenements from the height of the roof to the bottom of the cellar. Said Sawyer to do all the carpenters work inside and out except the blinds. Providing said Bemis builds two more tenements the same Sawyer to have them to build... being the nearly the same dimensions and finished in the same manner.
- July. Deed, Daniel J. Sawyer to Lewis Bemis [MLR 404/530] bounded on east by Common St. and on south by Middle St. This may be a correction of an erroneous 1840 deed MLR 391/321.
- Deed, Adolphus Smith [Deputy Sherriff] to Waltham Bank [MLR 424/526] Suit of Waltham Bank, plaintiff, vs. Lewis Bemis, defendant. The bank seized the real estate of Lewis Bemis, being a tract of land with four dwelling houses and other buildings, bounded on the south by Middle Street.

Discussion

The house was built in 1840 by a carpenter, Daniel J. Sawyer, for the owner, Lewis Bemis, cordwainer. Lewis Bemis had been born in 1802 in Lincoln, Massachusetts and was the son of Jonas Bemis and Tabitha Gove. He was a cordwainer or shoemaker by trade, and had a substantial shoemaking business in Waltham. In 1828, he purchased from the town of Waltham the property now numbered 380 Lexington Street. He married Hannah Sanderson Livermore in 1830. Lewis Bemis ran a sizeable shoemaking business out of his property on Lexington Street, but he did not hold any municipal offices.

Beginning in January, 1840, Lewis Bemis made a series of land purchases around the Exchange Street, Pond Street, Church Street and Middle Street areas. The first purchase, from Jacob Farwell, identifies Middle Street as a contemplated street. So Middle Street was most likely laid out by Bemis as part of a subdivision plan. He arranged to have a carpenter, Daniel J. Sawyer, build a two-family house, the dimensions of which are similar to the older portion of the current house. His original 1840 deeds show 264 feet of frontage on Middle Street, but by 1848, the property at 23-27 Middle Street had 75 feet of frontage. The original larger parcel was subdivided between 1847 and 1848. The U.S. economy went through one of the longest and deepest recessions of the 19th century from 1839 through 1843. In 1843, the Waltham Bank foreclosed on Bemis, and the property went through a series of turnovers until 1852.

In 1852, the house was purchased by Dennis McGuinness, an Irish day laborer. The McGuinness family lived in the house from 1852 to 1909, when the house was sold to Dennis McGuinness's daughter and her husband, Mary and Hugh Carroll. The Carrolls sold the house to Giuseppe Alessandro in 1917. So the house was owned by one family for 65 years.

After 1917, the house changed ownership until 1925, when Maria Buono and her husband, Michael purchased the house. But the property went into foreclosure in 1934, and was sold by the bank in 1939. The house was then rental property after 1939.

The Federal style – Greek revival architecture of the original house at # 23 (now 27) Middle Street is consistent with the 1840 date of construction. The house that abuts the property on the east side has

also similar style and dimensions, and may have been one of the four dwelling houses mentioned in the 1843 deed.

Conclusion

The house is one of the original houses built by Daniel J. Sawyer, a carpenter, in 1840 for owner, Lewis Bemis, when Middle Street was first laid out, and is therefore 179 years old. The Middle Street neighborhood was part of an older, working-class area that later grew up in the streets across from Saint Mary's church. The addition on the front of the house was built between 1870 and 1875.
