
1918 map

Timeline

- 1865 Census, Watson Stearns was listed at the same dwelling number as his mother Adeline Stearns, so this would have been on Main Street
- Deed, Watson Stearns et al to Mary C Stearns, a tract of land on east side of Grant Street [MLR 949/7]
- Directory, Watson Stearns, carpenter, house Grant, near Main. This was probably 68 Grant St. (across the street from 69 Grant St.)
- 1870 Census, Watson Stearns, Maria Stearns, gas pipefitter. Mary C. Stearns was living with her mother, Adeline, probably on Main Street.
- Directory, Watson Stearns, gas-fitter, Grant, near Main; Henry W. Stearns, clerk, bds Grant, near Main; Mary C. Stearns, teacher, intermediate school district No. 6, bds. 459 Main St.

Summary

The house at 69-71 Grant Street was originally numbered 67-69 Grant Street and was likely built between 1871 and 1874 for its first owner, Mary Crehore Stearns. The property was originally part of the estate of her father, Nathaniel Stearns, whose house was located on Main Street at what later became Grant Street. The original Stearns house on Main Street had been built in 1807 by Mary's grandfather, William Wellington Jr. This may have been the Wellington Tavern that William Wellington supposedly owned. The famed "Burgoyne Elm" stood in front of the Stearns house on Main Street, and there was a public well located here. According to one account, the founders of the Boston Manufacturing Company, Francis Cabot Lowell, Patrick Tracy Jackson and Paul Moody, stayed at this house when they first came to Waltham. Nathaniel Stearns was a trader in business with his partner, Elisha Crehore. Their business was located in the Stearns & Crehore Building, just west of the Lawrence Building (corner of Main & Common Sts.) Nathaniel Stearns, son of George Stearns and Ruth Watson, died in 1848.

In 1865, Watson Stearns, the son of Nathaniel Stearns, sold part of the Stearns estate to his sister, Mary C. Stearns. Watson Stearns was a carpenter, and a gas and plumbing fitter, and in 1880 employed four men in his business. Grant Street may have been laid out around this time. Watson had built a new house for himself across the street at 68 Grant Street. Mary C. Stearns and her mother Adeline (Wellington) Stearns, lived in her new house at 67-69 Grant Street beginning between 1871 and 1874. Mary C. Stearns was a 5th grade schoolteacher at the Banks School in Waltham. Mary lived with her mother Adaline (Wellington) Stearns until her mother's death in 1890. Mary was listed at her brother's address across the street in 1900, but in 1910, her brother, Watson, was listed at Mary's house. She was probably caring for him at that time. Watson Stearns died in 1914 and his sister, Mary, died in 1917. The

house was sold by her heirs to Max Cushinsky. After this sale, the house became rental property. Up to 1943, Michael McNamara, the manager of Morgan's Art Store lived at 69 Grant Street. The other tenants were ordinary working-class citizens.


The Nathaniel Stearns house on Main Street

In 1798, William Wellington, Jr., victualer, purchased 30 acres of land and buildings on Main Street from Daniel Mixer. The Mixer house stood by the famous Waltham landmark, the Burgoyne Elm, where prisoners-of-war, British General John Burgoyne and his troops, stopped to rest on their march to Cambridge. According to a 1907 newspaper article, William Wellington built the house in 1807. Considering his occupation, the size of the house, and its location by a public well, the house may prove the oral history about his tavern to be accurate.

Nathaniel Stearns was a trader, and was in business with a partner, Elisha Crehore. His business was located in the Stearns-Crehore Building, just west of the Lawrence Building. Stearns had married Adeline Wellington, the daughter of William Wellington.
