




OBITUARY. iı Elljah D. Moor. Elijah D. Moor, a well known coutractor and builder, and an old resident of this city, died at his home on Alder street, Thursday afternoon of congestion of the brain. He had been suffering the past summer with a cold, but last Friday was taken seriously ill and continued to fail until death came to his relief. Mr. Moor was born in New York state in 1816, and moved to this city in 1863 taking up his residence on Charles street. From here he moved to Exchange street, then to the Chemistry and finally to Alder street, where he has resided for the past twenty-four years.

The deceased leaves a wife and four children, three sons and one daughter. He was a brother of Rev. C. R. Moor of Cambridge, a Universalist minister, and who has preached in this city on several occasions.

The funeral will take place tomorrow

Discussion

The house was built in 1868-69 by Elijah Davis Moor, whose 1892 obituary describes him as a well-known building contractor. Moor had been born in 1816 in Washington County, New York, although his family moved to Vermont not long after. Moor and his brother, Clark Rice Moor, were active in the Universalist church. In 1845, Elijah D. Moor of Lowell was reported as superintendent of the 2nd Universalist Sunday School. His brother, Clark Rice Moor, was a Universalist minister. Elijah married Sarah Mulliken in Salem, Massachusetts in 1848, and he appears in the 1850 Salem census as an overseer of the weaving department in a cotton mill. The couple moved to Waltham in 1863, and lived initially on Charles Street and Exchange Street near Main Street. Although the 1869 directory lists Moor's address on Exchange Street, directories can be 1-2 years out of date. He purchased the lot from the American Waltham Watch Company in 1868, and probably built the house soon thereafter. He was living on Alder Street by 1870. He was always listed as a carpenter in Waltham records. A search of Waltham and other Massachusetts newspapers did not show that he held any prominent positions in municipal government or even in Universalist church activities in Waltham. His obituaries in the Waltham and Boston newspapers mentioned that he was a well-known contractor and builder in Waltham.

Elijah D. Moor's son, George Moor, had a daughter, Bessie, who married George Affleck. So Bessie Carter (Moor) Affleck was the granddaughter of Elijah D. Moor. She inherited the property from the estate of her aunt, May J. Moor, a Waltham schoolteacher. Bessie Carter (Moor) Affleck died in 1958. George and Bessie Affleck had a daughter, Ethel Affleck, who married Allen Bomengen. George Affeck sold the property to Ethel (Affleck) and Allen Bomengen in 1959. So the house remained in the family of Elijah Moor and his descendants almost 100 years, from 1868 to 1962. The Bomengens sold the property to Arthur and Lucy Bennett in 1962, and Lucy and her son, Arthur Bennett II still own the property now.

Conclusion

The house was built in 1868-69, and is therefore over 75 years old, and was one of the early houses of the Waltham Watch Company district. The house was built by Elijah Davis Moor, and owned and lived in by his grandchild and great grandchild until 1962. The house was always owner-occupied. Elijah Davis Moor was a well-known contractor and builder in Waltham, but was not a historically significant person.
