

Official Proclamation

WHEREAS, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, declaring the slaves in Confederate territory free, paying the way for the passing of the 13th Amendment which formally abolished slavery in the United States of America: and

WHEREAS, Word about the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation was delayed by some two and one half years, to June 19, 1865, in reaching authorities and African-Americans in the South and Southwestern United States; and

WHEREAS, Emancipation Day observations are held on different days in different states in the South and Southwest, and in other parts of the nation; and

WHEREAS, June 19th has a special meaning to African-Americans, and is called "JUNETEENTH" combining the words June and Nineteenth, and has been celebrated by the African-American community for over 150 years; and

WHEREAS, The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has recognized June 19th as a legal holiday to celebrate the emancipation of African-Americans and their contribution; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that I, Jeannette A. McCarthy, Mayor of Waltham do hereby proclaim Saturday, June 19, 2021, as "Juneteenth Day" in the City of Waltham. and urge all citizens to become more aware of the significance of this celebration in the African-American History and in the heritage of our nation and City.
